

Adjectives and Adverbs – Worksheet 2 - ANSWERS

Exercise 1: Error Correction – Adjectives and Adverbs (Answers in Bold)

- 1. She sang **beautifully** in the concert. (Adverbs describe verbs "sang beautifully")
- 2. He was driving very **carefully** in the rain. *(Adverbs describe verbs "driving carefully")*
- 3. This soup tastes **bad**, I don't like it. *(Linking verbs like "taste" take adjectives, not adverbs)*
- 4. He worked **hard** to finish his project on time. *(Irregular adverb "hard" stays the same as an adjective and adverb)*
- 5. They arrived **late** to the party and missed the speech. *(Irregular adverb "late" stays the same)*
- 6. My grandmother is a **really** kind person. *(Correct as it is "really" is a degree adverb modifying "kind")*
- 7. She looked **angry** when she heard the bad news. *(Linking verbs like "look" take adjectives, not adverbs)*
- 8. He answered the question **perfectly** and got full marks. **(***Adverbs describe verbs "answered perfectly"***)**
- 9. That test was **extremely** difficult! *(Degree adverb "extremely" modifies "difficult")*
- 10. He talks **too quickly** during his presentations. *(Adverbs modify verbs "talks too quickly")*

Exercise 2: Conversation – Insert a Suitable Adjective or Adverb (Suggested Answers in Bold)

Sarah: Hi, John! You look really tired/happy/relaxed today. What's going on?

John: Oh, I just finished my project! I worked hard/diligently on it all week.

Sarah: That's great! I hope your teacher gives you a good/high grade.

John: I hope so too! It was a challenging/difficult assignment, but I tried my best.

Sarah: I'm sure you did. You always complete your work carefully/neatly/properly.

John: Thanks! What about you? You seem stressed/exhausted/annoyed today.



Sarah: Yeah, I had a terrible/busy/hectic morning. My bus was late, and I had to run quickly/rushed to get to class on time!

John: That sounds stressful! But I'm sure your day will end well/nicely/positively.

Sarah: I hope so! Anyway, let's go get some hot/delicious/strong coffee and relax!
