## **Exercise 1: Sentence Matching – Possessive Pronouns**

## Explanation

- $\checkmark$  Possessive pronouns replace a noun (mine, yours, his, hers, ours, theirs).
- $\checkmark$  They show ownership and usually appear at the end of the sentence.
- $\checkmark$  "Its" is NOT a possessive pronoun; it's a possessive adjective.

#### **Explanation**

- ✓ Possessive adjectives come before a noun (my, your, his, her, its, our, their).
- $\checkmark$  They show who something belongs to.
- $\checkmark$  "Its" is only used for objects or animals (NOT people).

#### **Final Summary**

- Subject pronouns do the action (I, you, he, she, it, we, they).
- **Object pronouns** receive the action (me, you, him, her, it, us, them).
- **Possessive pronouns** replace a noun to show ownership (mine, yours, his, hers, ours, theirs).
- **Possessive adjectives** come before a noun to show ownership (my, your, his, her, its, our, their).
