

Zero, First and Second Conditional – Worksheet 2 – ANSWERS

K Exercise 1: Sentence Correction - ANSWERS

- If she will study, she will pass the test.
 ✓ If she studies, she will pass the test.
 → First conditional → No "will" in the "if" clause
- 2. X If I would have more time, I would learn a new language.
 ✓ If I had more time, I would learn a new language.
 → Second conditional → "If + past simple," not "would have"
- 3. X If he goes to bed late, he would be tired.
 ✓ If he went to bed late, he would be tired.
 → Second conditional → Hypothetical present
- 4. X If you don't eat breakfast, you will be always hungry.
 ✓ If you don't eat breakfast, you will always be hungry.
 → Word order correction: "always" comes after "will be."
- 5. X If we would leave now, we would arrive early.
 ✓ If we left now, we would arrive early.
 → Second conditional → No "would" in the "if" clause
- 6. X If I am you, I wouldn't do that.
 ✓ If I were you, I wouldn't do that.
 → Second conditional → "If I were" (formal, fixed expression)
- 7. X If water boils, it will turn into steam.
 ✓ If water boils, it turns into steam.
 → Zero conditional → Present simple in both clauses
- 8. X If she would study, she would pass the exam.
 ✓ If she studied, she would pass the exam.
 → Second conditional → "If + past simple," not "would"
- 9. X If I win the lottery, I would buy a new car.
 ✓ If I won the lottery, I would buy a new car.
 → Second conditional → Hypothetical situation
- 10. X If the sun will shine, we will go to the beach.
 ✓ If the sun shines, we will go to the beach.
 → First conditional → No "will" in the "if" clause



Exercise 2: Transformation (Using Conditional Structures) – ANSWERS

- If I had enough money, I would buy a new car.
 → Second conditional → Hypothetical situation in the present
- If you touch fire, you get burned.
 → Zero conditional → General fact
- 3. If she studies, she will pass the exam.
 → First conditional → Likely future event
- 4. If he exercised, he would be fit.
 → Second conditional → Hypothetical present situation
- 5. If I win the lottery, I will buy a mansion.
 → First conditional → Possible future event
- 6. If the sun shines, we will go to the beach.
 → First conditional → Likely future event
- 7. If you don't water the plants, they die.
 → Zero conditional → General fact
- 8. If she spoke Spanish, she could work in Spain.
 → Second conditional → Hypothetical present situation
- 9. If I invite him, he will come to the party.
 → First conditional → Possible future event
- 10. If he worked hard, he would get promoted.
 → Second conditional → Hypothetical present situation

@ Key Takeaways for Students

✓ Zero Conditional → General truths or facts (If you heat ice, it melts.)

✓ First Conditional → Real and possible future events (*If it rains, I will take an umbrella*.)

✓ Second Conditional → Hypothetical or unlikely situations (If I had a yacht, I would sail around the world.)

✓ No "will" in the "if" clause \rightarrow If he studies, he will pass (\checkmark) NOT If he will study (\checkmark).

✓ "Were" instead of "was" in Second Conditional \rightarrow If I were rich, I would travel the world.

✓ Modal verbs (might/could/should) in conditionals to express probability \rightarrow *If we leave* now, we **might** be on time.
