

## Past Perfect Continuous – Worksheet 1 - ANSWERS

### Exercise 1: Cloze Task – Past Perfect or Past Perfect Continuous (Answers)

1. By the time we got to the airport, the plane **had taken off**. ✓ (Past Perfect – "taking off" was a completed action before arrival.)
  2. She was exhausted because she **had been working** all day. ✓ (Past Perfect Continuous – an ongoing action leading up to exhaustion.)
  3. He didn't recognize her because she **had changed** a lot since the last time they met. ✓ (Past Perfect – "change" is a completed action, not continuous.)
  4. They **had been waiting** for over an hour before the bus arrived. ✓ (Past Perfect Continuous – "waiting" was an ongoing action before another past event.)
  5. I was really hungry because I **had not eaten** all day. ✓ (Past Perfect – "not eating" is a completed state, not an ongoing action.)
  6. When we arrived at the party, Tom **had already left**. ✓ (Past Perfect – "leaving" was a completed action before arrival.)
  7. He failed the exam because he **had not studied** enough. ✓ (Past Perfect – "studying" was completed before failing the exam.)
  8. We **had been driving** for six hours when we finally stopped for a break. ✓ (Past Perfect Continuous – "driving" was ongoing before stopping.)
  9. The road was wet because it **had been raining** all morning. ✓ (Past Perfect Continuous – "raining" was ongoing before the past event.)
  10. By the time I found my keys, we **had missed** the train. ✓ (Past Perfect – "missing" was a completed action before another past event.)
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### Exercise 2: Error Correction – Past Perfect vs. Past Perfect Continuous (Answers in Bold)

1. She **had known** him for years before they got married. ✓ (Correction: "had been knowing" → "had known"; "know" is a stative verb and does not take continuous forms.)
2. When I arrived, they **had left** already. ✓ (Correction: "had been left" → "had left"; Past Perfect is needed for a completed action.)
3. He was tired because he **had been running** five kilometers that morning. ✓ (Correct as is! Past Perfect Continuous expresses an ongoing action before another past event.)
4. I was happy because I **had won** the competition. ✓ (Correction: "had been winning" → "had won"; "winning" is a completed achievement, not a continuous action.)

5. She was upset because they **had told** her the bad news. ✓ (Correction: "had been telling" → "had told"; "tell" refers to a single completed event, not continuous.)
  6. We were late because the car **had broken down** on the way. ✓ (Correction: "had been breaking down" → "had broken down"; "break down" is a completed action, not continuous.)
  7. When I arrived at the hotel, I found out that they **had lost** my reservation. ✓ (Correction: "had been losing" → "had lost"; "losing" is not an ongoing action but a completed event.)
  8. They **had been living / had lived** in Spain for ten years before they moved to France. ✓ (Both tenses work! "Had lived" suggests a completed period, while "had been living" emphasizes the ongoing nature of the stay.)
  9. He **had been working / had worked** at the same company before he got promoted. ✓ (Both tenses work! "Had worked" refers to a completed action, while "had been working" emphasizes the duration of the work.)
  10. I was wet because I **had been walking** in the rain for over an hour. ✓ (Correct as is! Past Perfect Continuous emphasizes the ongoing nature of "walking" before another past event.)
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## Key Takeaways

### ✓ Past Perfect (had + past participle)

- ✓ Used for **completed actions before another past event** (By the time we arrived, the train *had left*.)
- ✓ Often used with "**by the time,**" "**before,**" "**already,**" "**never,**" etc. (She *had never travelled abroad* before moving to Spain.)
- ✓ Used for **single completed past events** (He *had won the match* before celebrating.)

### ✓ Past Perfect Continuous (had been + verb-ing)

- ✓ Used for **ongoing past actions leading up to another past event** (She *was tired* because she *had been working* all day.)
- ✓ Used with "**for,**" "**since,**" "**how long,**" etc. (They *had been waiting* for an hour before the bus came.)
- ✓ **Cannot** be used with stative verbs (know, have, like, believe), so we use **Past Perfect** instead (She *had known* him for years).
